



motivated to do her part, organizing friends and neighbors to clean up a lake, plant trees, make compost bins, and host a clothing swap. (Grades 1-3)




The Mess We Made

Zee Grows a Tree


by Elizabeth Rusch. Candlewick Press, 2021.
